School Description and Mission Statement

Brookside School, a past California Distinguished School and recipient of the Golden Bell Award, is housed on two separate sites in suburban San Anselmo. The enrollment at our lower campus in 2005-2006 was 281 students with 16 certificated and 14 classified staff. There were two specialists and support staff. The enrollment at upper campus was 255 students with 12 certificated teachers and 9 classified staff. Upper Campus had 4 specialists and support staff. Parent participation is encouraged and we have a very active Parent-Faculty Club.

Instruction includes an interdisciplinary approach with a strong emphasis on the basic skills. Both Upper and Lower campuses have libraries and school gardens. Each campus also has a sports field. Childcare is provided at Lower Campus for K-5.

Expectations for students continue to be communicated, modeled and reinforced by all staff members throughout the year. A Character Education Plan was developed as part of the school plan. This includes a Bully-Proofing program, conflict resolution and a Life Skills Program. Rules and classroom lessons on good relationships help maintain a safe and appropriate atmosphere for learning. Each school strives to foster an attitude of cooperation, responsibility for personal behavior and sensitivity to risks.

School Facility Conditions and Improvements

The Ross Valley School District's main priority for facilities is providing safe and enhanced learning environments for students and staff. To that end, the District continues to focus on the implementation of the Master Facilities Plan, which is being funded by a Facility Bond, generously passed by the Ross Valley community in March 1999, as well as modernization funding from the State of California under Proposition 47.

The Project Manager is responsible for the project management of all new construction and modernization projects funded by the facility bond and State modernization fund. He ensures that the projects meet all state requirements and that the safety of children and staff during construction is a priority on all projects.

The Director of Maintenance & Operations oversees the maintenance and grounds personnel during the routine repair, maintenance and upkeep of our existing buildings, deferred maintenance at all of our sites and cleanliness of the grounds and playgrounds. Bathrooms are cleaned once daily and regularly inspected throughout the day and cleaned as necessary. All facility repairs are carried out in a timely manner by school and district level maintenance and grounds staff.

The Executive Committee is comprised of the Superintendent, one Board Member, Project Manager, Director of Maintenance & Operations and District Architects. The committee is responsible for the oversight of new construction, modernization, landscaping and major maintenance projects in the district and the committee makes recommendations to the Board of Trustees for final approval of construction projects. These projects are funded by the bond proceeds (\$19.8 million), state modernization funds (3.9 million), developer fees, parcel tax and deferred maintenance as well as parent/community contributions in accordance with Board Policy 1260.

Teacher Evaluation Process

The current evaluation process was developed by a committee of seven teacher representatives and administrators during the 1999-2000 school year.

The six standards that have been adopted by the Ross Valley School District are also the standards that have been adopted by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing and the Beginning Teacher Support and Assessment Programs. The six standards represent a developmental, holistic view of teaching, and are organized around six interrelated categories of teaching practice. Each standard is further defined by key elements listing specific indicators. Ed Code requirements (Stull Act) are also be adhered to.

For teachers with fewer than six years of teaching experience, the focus lies with defined goals pertaining to each of the six standards. After year six, teachers are still evaluated on all six standards but may choose to focus on one or two through professional development goals.

Under each plan there are formal and informal observation requirements, pre- and/or post-observation conferences, 2 professional development journal entries for temporary and probationary teachers, and summative evaluation requirements.

XI. Instructional Planning and Scheduling

School Instruction and Leadership

This section provides information about the structure of the school's instructional program and the experience of the school's leadership team.

Brookside Elementary is committed to the highest quality instructional program. Parents, teachers and administrators are involved in regular assessment of program quality and on-going program development to better address the needs of our students and to remain in alignment with the California State Frameworks and State Standards.

Curriculum work focused on the adopted California Content Standards in Language Arts and Mathematics, Science and Social Studies. Grade level meetings provide forums for discussion as well as opportunities for peer assistance with curriculum implementation as changes are made. Classroom observations and site grade level meetings focused on implementation of the standards.

In addition to basic skills, the District has offered an opportunity to explore project-based learning whereby children identify and solve problems through inquiry and research. Partnerships with the STRAW Project have provided support for these programs.

Brookside Elementary is committed to shared-decision making. All members of the school community have an opportunity to assist in setting the goals of the District and schools. Goals are established through

participation on the School Site Council, the District's Advisory Council, District ad-hoc committees and by attendance at Board of Trustees' meetings. Brookside has a teacher leadership team. This team represents the school on the District Advisory Committee and works closely with the School Site Council, an elected group of teachers, classified staff and parents.

Students with special needs are placed in programs to best address individual goals. Special education students learn in the least restrictive environment that may include a regular classroom placement, special assistance and specialized classes.

English language learners are assessed and progress towards fluency is monitored for redesignation as English proficient. We are committed to equitable treatment of all members of the school community regardless of language, gender, ethnicity or special need. All teachers at Brookside meet the requirements of "Highly Qualified" as defined by "No Child Left Behind".

This school year marked the 11th year of the District's alternative education program, the Multiage Program. This program is designed to provide for a high degree of participation and student-centered curriculum. It serves students throughout the district and is housed on the Manor campus.

Professional Development

This section provides information about the program for training the school's teachers and other professional staff.

Opportunities for participation in professional development activities by teachers, staff and administrators are made available through District, school, categorical, foundation, Parent Clubs and PTA funds.

Professional development is focused to support the Ross Valley School District mission and goals. This may include site and District-based training, county offerings, state and national conferences, workshops as appropriate and days in the District calendar scheduled for professional development for all teachers. The focus of the three staff development days and early release on Wednesdays throughout the year included curriculum training in math, reading and assessment.

Beginning teachers in the Ross Valley School District are supported in their first two years of teaching through the Beginning Teacher Support and Assessment Program (BTSA). This is a state directed program coordinated by the Marin County Office of Education for all districts in Marin County.

Beginning teachers are paired with an experienced colleague as a support provider. All support providers receive intensive training in the California Formative Assessment and Support System for Teachers (CFASST). The training prepares the support provider for observing in the classroom, giving feedback and guiding the beginning teacher in his/her professional growth based on the California Standards for the Teaching Profession. Beginning teachers meet with their support provider several times a month.

Those teachers who do not qualify for BTSA because of their part-time status or unique teaching situation, are provided with individual, tailored support to meet specific needs.

An orientation program at the beginning of the year familiarizes all beginning teachers with district and site operations and services. In addition, beginning teachers are given time to observe in the classrooms of experienced teachers.

The goal of the Beginning Teacher Support Program in the Ross Valley School District is to meet the needs beginning teachers, to increase classroom expertise and to assist new teachers in providing a strong educational program for students.
