The areas that are in good condition that need attention are the Interior surfaces and restrooms. Interior surfaces that need attention are carpets. The main restrooms could use remodeling. The campus will get some updating in 2014 but overall is in functioning order. The campus was built in 1957 and from 2000 to 2003 the district added a new administration and multiuse building with art and music rooms. The school was completely modernized in 2003. Overall rating was 98.4.

School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2010–11)

Brookside School, a past California Distinguished School and recipient of the Golden Bell Award, is housed on two separate sites in suburban San Anselmo. The enrollment at our lower campus in 2010-2011 was 316 students with 20 certificated and 14 classified staff. The enrollment at upper campus was 367 students with 24 certificated teachers and 9 classified staff. Parent participation is encouraged, and we have a very active Parents Club.

Instruction includes an interdisciplinary approach with a strong emphasis on the basic skills. Both Upper and Lower campuses have libraries and school gardens. Each campus also has a sports field. Before- and after-school childcare is provided at both campuses.

III. School Climate

School Safety Plan (School Year 2010–11)

The Board of Trustees adopted the Ross Valley School District's School Safety Plan in August of 1998. The plan details procedures for child abuse reporting. It also includes procedures for disaster preparedness and response. Our site's emergency plan includes a complete NIMS chart, nine emergency drills per year, and emergency training for all staff. Training includes search and rescue, basic first aid, and student release. Our emergency supply container is checked and re-stocked yearly. Board policies on suspension and expulsion, procedures to notify teachers of dangerous pupils, sexual harassment, school-wide dress code, procedures of safe ingress and egress of pupils and rules and procedures on school discipline are also components of the plan. The plan may be reviewed in detail at the District Office.

IX. Student Performance

Standardized Testing and Reporting Program

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including:

- **California Standards Tests (CSTs)**, which include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, and nine through eleven.
- **California Modified Assessment (CMA)**, an alternate assessment that is based on modified achievement standards in ELA for grades three through eleven; mathematics for grades three through seven, Algebra I, and Geometry; and science in grades five and eight, and Life Science in grade ten. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations.
- **California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA)**, includes ELA and mathematics in grades two through eleven, and science for grades five, eight, and ten. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations.

The assessments under the STAR Program show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. On each of these assessments, student scores are reported as performance levels.
